Letter from Mayor Ryan

I hope you all had a good winter and are looking forward to spring. Things have changed in the Village offices. Our Village Clerk, Mrs. Janet Durr, has retired after 39 years of service. We thank her for the dedicated service to our office, residents and community. We wish her the very best in her retirement. We are fortunate that Janet was instrumental in helping us find her replacement. Mrs. Sarah Dobson who interned during high school for Janet has accepted the position and was sworn in as Village Clerk at our February Village Board meeting.

As we prepare for the upcoming spring and summer, the Village's main thoroughfare will be undergoing some major upgrades which will affect travel throughout the Village. The State of New York DOT, in coordination with the Mohawk Valley Water Authority, has let out for bid a contract to replace our 100 year old water main along Genesee Street this spring and summer. While this is good news to replace aging infrastructure, it will be an inconvenience to our residents, businesses and people who travel throughout our Village. Parking along Genesee Street will be unavailable at times and single lane traffic may be encountered during the construction.

Simultaneous to the NYSDOT project, the Village of New Hartford DPW will be milling the Bohling Road area and Pearl Street in preparation for paving. As you can see we have a lot of infrastructure being replaced in our Village. This will create some unusual traffic follow through the Village. Please stay alert. Our Memorial Day Parade will be on Monday, May 29th at 7 pm. The NYSDOT has told us the work on Genesee Street will not interfere with the Memorial Day Parade. We look forward to seeing everyone at the parade.

Our Village Board is excited about our park enhancement project. We have setup a parks committee to help with planning. The NYSDOT project has hampered our desire to move forward until the Genesee Street water main replacement and paving are done which is to be completed in the fall of 2024. We will continue to provide our band concerts and we look forward to the Farmer's Market moving to the park this summer on Wednesdays. Stay tune for times.

The Village of New Hartford is participating in the Mohawk Valley Home Town Hero's Banner program. Each banner features the name, military branch, rank and years of service/war served along with photo of the veteran. The veteran honored can be living or deceased. We look forward to displaying these banners on our light poles honoring our local military service members who have served our country. They will be displayed from Memorial Day to Veterans Day.

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I know the traffic during the last two years of the Route 8 & 12 bridge reconstruction created a lot more traffic through our busy intersection at Genesee, Oxford and Mill Streets. We will have to gear up for this next phase of infrastructure upgrades to the Village. Please stay alert and drive carefully through the Village to keep our workers safe and obey all flag persons.

The above elected Officers represents over 650 years of combined experience of serving our neighbors within the New Hartford Fire District.

Chief Bolanowski recapped the department's 2022 history along with recognizing several members for their outstanding service to the department and to the community. He noted that well over 24,000 volunteer hours were logged for calls, training, and other department activities.

Since 1901, 845 individuals have stepped forward and answered the call. Of that 845, 99 are current members. Combined, these 845 members have given approximately 7,000 years of service. The average length of service for past members is 8 years 6 months. The average of our **current** 99 members is: **21 years 9 months of service!**

To date, only 8 members have surpassed the 50 year milestone. Past Fire Police Captain Thomas Randall*, 66 yrs; past Chief Ed Hanley, 65 yrs; past Chief William Freiburger III*, 58 yrs; past Chief David Reynolds*, 55 yrs; past Director Leslie Dean, 53 yrs, past Chief Paul Lewis, 52 yrs; past Assistant Chief Harold Lewis, 50 yrs; and past President George Glass Jr., 50 yrs.

SPECIAL RECOGNITION

IRONMAN AWARD

The William G. Martin "Ironman Award" is given to a deserving member of each of the town's three volunteer fire department's annually. This award, named in honor of Mr. Martin, a 40-year member of the New Hartford Volunteer Fire Department, was first presented to William Martin in 1991. The award recognizes the volunteer firefighter who is ever ready, ever willing, and ever present to serve the community. The recipient of this award has exemplified an outstanding dedication to service. The New Hartford Town Board recognizes the resolve, commitment, and genuine enthusiasm of this individual as an inspiration to all. This year's award was presented posthumously to **David M. Corr**. This is the 31st year that this award has been presented to an active and outstanding member of the department.

**MICHAEL D. SOWICH “ FIREFIGHTER OF
THE YEAR” AWARD**

The Michael D. Sowich "Firefighter of the year" award was established in memory of a NHFD member, who had taught various state fire school classes spanning a 15 year relationship with the department. To honor his love for firefighting and his dedication to teaching others, NHFD dedicated their "Firefighter of the Year Award to honor his memory. This year's award was presented to **Matthew Bailey**.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL TECHNICIAN OF THE YEAR AWARD

NHFD established the William V. Kelly award in honor of a 39 year member who in 1927 established what would become today's "Emergency Medical Service (EMS) program. In his honor, NHFD annually recognizes members who go "above and beyond" the call of service to the fire department. This year's honoree is **Jonathan Montano**.

NHFD ROOKIE OF THE YEAR

NHFD established the "Rookie of the Year Award" to honor a firefighter who is within the first three years of their service. Although on a probation period (which covers the first three years of active service) the firefighter is reviewed annually. This award recognizes the new member who has gone above and beyond the service expected of a rookie firefighter. This year's award was presented to **John Haggerty**.

2023 Municipal Waste Collection Guidelines

Weekly Garbage Collection

Collected Tuesday and Friday morning. Have out to curb by 4 am.

- Garbage containing recyclables will not be collected
- Garbage must be in cans or heavy-duty plastic bags. No 55 gallon barrels.
- No hot ashes allowed.
- No hazardous liquids (antifreeze, oil, cleaning products, paint). Empty, dry paint cans are allowed.
- 50 pound limit per bag or can.
- Heavy, commercial, industrial, medical and special waste will not be collected by Village crews.

Weekly Recyclable Collection

Collected Thursday morning. Have out to curb by 4 am.

Refer to the OHSWA website at www.ohswa.org/recycle/curbside-recycling/acceptable-material for a list of acceptable recycling material.

Bulk Trash and Junk Disposal Options

Option #1: Curbside Collection

*Collected on the **second Monday** in May and October. Have at curb by 5 am.*

Category collected: A, B, C, D, E, F
Collection limits for category A, B, C are limited to 4 foot wide by 8 foot long by 3 feet high each.

Collection limit for category D is one each.

- Only one collection per category per street.
- Material must be sorted and contained as specified in category description.
- No batteries, paints or liquids will be collected.

Option #2: Drop off at Dumpster

Drop off at dumpster located at DPW Garage on 2 Mill Street.

*The **second Saturday** of April, June, July, August, September and November.*

- Open from 8:00 am to 4:00 pm
- Categories accepted: A, B, C, D, E

*The **second Saturday** of January, February, March and December.*

- Open from 8:00 am to 12:00 pm
- Categories accepted: B, C, D, E

An attendant will be present to aid loading and verify proof of residence.

Waste must be separated as described below:

A) Construction and Demolition: Wood and lumber tied in bundles not exceeding 8 feet long by 18 inches in diameter, plaster and shingles in containers, porcelain sinks and toilets, storm windows and doors.

B) Sanitary Waste: Clothes, mattresses, stuffed furniture, toys, televisions and rugs.

C) Metals: Pipe not exceeding 8 feet long, tire rims, bikes, cast tubs and sinks, washers and dryers.

D) Appliances Containing Refrigerants: Refrigerators, freezers, dehumidifiers, A/C units. Limited to 1 per collection.

E) Tires: Dismounted from rims, 16 inch or less, no tractor or heavy truck tires collected. Limited to 6 tires per collection.

F) Hard fill: Stones, dirt, rocks, 1 cubic yard per collection.

2023 Municipal Waste Collection Guidelines

Green Waste Guidelines

April 1 through May 15 & October 1 through November 15

Due to the large volume of green waste during this period, no specific collection day can be given.

- ♦ Each street will be collected once a week
- ♦ Loose leaves will be collected between the sidewalk and the curb.
- ♦ No leaves in plastic bags.
- ♦ If you prefer to contain waste, use cans only.
- ♦ Brush and vegetation will be collected but must be kept separate from leaf piles.
- ♦ Do not pile material in roadway.
- ♦ Limbs must be tied in bundles no more than 6 foot in length and 18 inches in diameter. Pile limbs parallel to curb.

Compost is available free of charge while supplies last and can be picked up outside the old Village brush dump located at the end of Graham Ave. Bring a shovel and container.



This is an overview of the collection schedule for our solid waste code and is not intended to be inclusive of all sections of code. This schedule may be subject to change.

May 16-September 30

*Collected Wednesday.
Have at curb by 7am.*

- ♦ Leaves, grass clippings, and hedge clippings must be in metal or plastic bins.
- ♦ No plastic bags allowed.
- ♦ Limbs must be tied in bundles no more than 6 foot in length and 18 inches in diameter. Pile limbs parallel to curb
- ♦ Individual limbs not to exceed 6 foot long or 12 inches in diameter.
- ♦ No stumps allowed.
- ♦ Do not pile in roadway.
- ♦ Tree removal contractors must remove their waste.

Christmas trees will be collected at the curb
January 1st through January 31st

It is a violation of our county and local ordinance to transport waste from one residence to another in an attempt to avoid paying for your own waste. Violation of an ordinance results in the issuance of a ticket, court date, and fine per local law.

2023 Water Quality and Drainage Systems Control

Overview

Normally, our sanitary sewer system has the capacity to operate properly. However, during heavy rains and sudden snow melts, storm water can overwhelm the sanitary sewer system and cause overflow into the Mohawk River. That storm water enters the sanitary sewer system from multiple sources: deteriorated and damaged public sanitary sewers; and private property connections, such as roof leaders and sump pumps. Contact the Village of New Hartford at (315)-732-1147 to determine if your downspout falls within the legal parameters as many are unsafe and can overwhelm the sanitary sewer system.

Use a Rain Barrel to Catch Runoff Water

Capture the water that used to drain into the sewer system from your roof by using a rain barrel and then repurpose it in your gardens or other outdoor jobs.

- Position the barrel directly under the downspout. Make sure it is level.
- Use a hacksaw to cut your downspout
- If needed, add a converter to direct the downspout to the screened opening on top of the barrel.



DO NOT FLUSH....

- Baby wipes
- Hazardous waste (i.e. paint, gas, cleansers, or chemically laden products)
- Rubber or latex
- Prescription drugs
- Dental floss
- Fats, oils and greases



How to dispose of Fats, Oils and Greases

- Pour warm (not hot) liquid into jar, can or container.
- Wait for liquid to cool
- Dispose of waste into trash or drop off at Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority's Residential Convenience Station on Leland Ave in Utica. If you have additional questions, contact OHSWA at 315-733-1224.

Common Sources of Fats, Oils and Greases

- Cooking Oils
- Meat fats
- Dairy products
- Cream based sauces
- Fatty or greasy food scraps
- Baked goods or pastries
- Salad dressing or mayonnaise
- Lard, shortening, butter, margarine

Municipal Separate Stormwater Sewer Systems (aka MS4)

What is Stormwater?

Stormwater is water from rain or melting snow that doesn't soak into the ground but runs off into waterways. As the runoff flows over the land or impervious surfaces (such as paved streets, parking lots, and building rooftops), it may accumulate debris, chemicals, sediment or other pollutants that could adversely affect water quality in the receiving water body.

Polluted runoff may impact lakes, rivers, wetland and other waterways in a variety of ways. For example, transported soil may cloud the waterway and interfere with the habitat of fish and plant life. Nutrients such as phosphorus and nitrogen (that are often found in fertilizer) can promote the overgrowth of algae, deplete oxygen in the waterway and be harmful to other aquatic life. Toxic chemicals from automobiles, sediment from construction activities and careless application of pesticides and herbicides threaten the health of the receiving waterway and can kill fish and other aquatic life. Bacteria from human and animal wastes can make nearby lakes and streams unsafe for wading, swimming and the propagation of edible fish.

According to an inventory conducted by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), half of the impaired waterways studied are affected by stormwater runoff originating in urban/suburban areas and construction sites. Stormwater management, especially in urban areas, is the focus for seeking further reductions in pollution in waterways.



The Village of New Hartford is implementing the components of our Stormwater Management Plan (SWMP) as mandated by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation. The SWMP is required in our community because the Village is considered a Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System Operator (MS4). The MS4 regulations require our Village to ensure that the discharge from our stormwater system into the waters of the State of New York meet water quality standards and doesn't contribute to, or cause, a water quality violation.

Stormwater runoff from your facility which is located within the Village may be directly connected via a privately owned collection system on your property or gravity drain from your property into the Village's stormwater system.

The Village is required to inform businesses of the following best management examples that, if followed, will ensure the stormwater runoff from your property or business will protect and improve water quality and will prevent an illicit discharge violation. The Village is also required to perform inspections on commercial properties to detect and prevent illicit discharges into the Village stormwater system.

Examples of best management practices your business is required to follow:

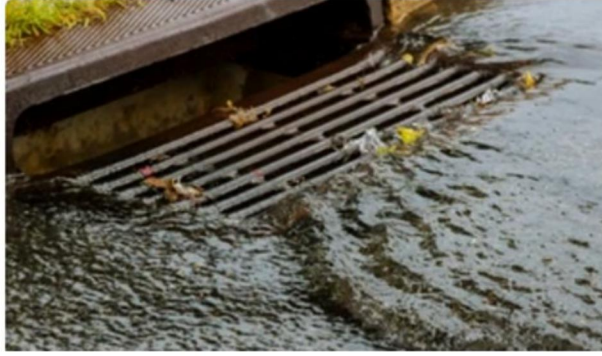
- Develop a "Spill Response Plan" and train your employees on the proper procedure to follow in the event you have an accidental spill or discharge.
- Post emergency phone numbers and report spills to the Fire Department at 315-732-1710 and the DEC Hazardous Spill Reporting Hotline at 1-800-457-7362.
- Wash and degrease your vehicles at a proper facility that disposes waste water properly.
- Never wash spilled chemicals, trash, or grease into a parking lot or into a storm drain inlet.
- Keep trash areas clean and the lids on dumpsters and garbage containers closed.
- Clean litter and debris from sidewalks, driveways, and parking lots, especially around storm drains. Dirt, oil, and debris that collect in these areas can be washed into the storm sewer and eventually will enter the Sauquoit Creek.
- Lawn care fertilizers and pesticides applied to your landscape can ultimately run off into the stormwater system. Don't apply before a heavy rain and follow label instructions carefully to prevent over-application.
- Make sure landscaping wastes such as grass clippings and leaves are not deposited in the roadway as debris can plug storm drains and cause localized flooding as well as environmental concerns and violations.

Thank you for helping keep the stormwater runoff from the Village free from pollutants.

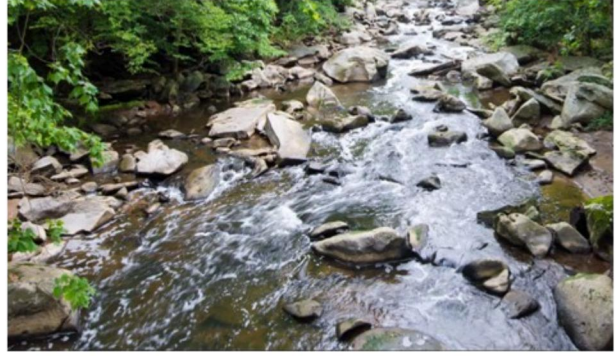

The Village of New Hartford DPW is committed to stormwater management and promoting awareness on stormwater drainage. The Village of New Hartford is trying to stop this pollution from happening and is currently a voting member of the Sauquoit Creek Intermunicipal Commission, working to reduce this type of pollution from occurring.

The DPW also submits an annual MS4 permit. The MS4 aka the Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System is a permit that must be completed and its purpose is to instill the NYS requirements for protecting its waters. Celebrating 40 Years as Tree City USA!

We are honored to be selected as a Tree City USA by Arbor Day for the 40th year in a row. This program celebrates the importance of an urban tree canopy and the improved care of vital village trees.

The Village of New Hartford achieved Tree City USA recognition by meeting the program's four requirements: a tree board or department, a tree-care ordinance, an annual community forestry budget of at least \$2 per capita and an Arbor Day observance and proclamation.

Where would we be without trees? These noble protectors give us so much and ask for so little. Their list of good deeds is long and generous: from cleaning our air and water, to keeping us nourished and healthy, to offering us an outdoor space that improves our mood, our health, and overall well-being.

Trees Improve Water Quality By:

- Absorbing 25 to 35 percent of rainfall and controlling flooding better than a manmade system
- Restricting stormwater runoff from reaching our waterways
- Filtering heavy metals and other pollutants

Trees Enhance Air Quality By:

- Lowering outdoor temperatures, which reduces energy consumption and the pollution it creates
- Capturing carbon emissions that lead to climate change. A single tree removes 22 lbs of carbon per year.
- Absorbing hundreds of thousands of metric tons of air pollution a year and replacing it with oxygen.

Trees Build Vibrant Neighborhoods By:

- Inviting neighbors to go outdoors and connect with one another
- Reducing instances of vandalism, graffiti and littering
- Lowering crime rates and acts of aggression
- Growing a sense of community

CODES DEPARTMENT

Quick Code Reminders on Property Maintenance

♦Cutting of Weeds and Grass: The owners, tenants, and occupants of lots and premises in the Village shall cut and trim grass and weeds and shall remove all accumulations of rubbish or other matter injurious to the use and appearance; and shall in any event cut all noxious weeds, long grass and other rank growth at least once in each month from May to October.



♦Garbage Removal: An occupant of a premise shall be responsible for compliance with Village Law in regard to the following: Disposal of garbage and refuse into appropriate facilities in a clean and sanitary manner. Adequate sanitary facilities and methods shall be used for the collection, storage, handling



and disposal of garbage and refuse in accordance with the provisions of Village of New Hartford codes. Each owner of any building from which garbage, rubbish, mixed refuse, ashes or other wastes are collected shall provide refuse containers sufficient in numbers to hold all collectible wastes which may accumulate.

♦Exterior Building Maintenance: Exterior surfaces, including but not limited to, doors, door and window frames, cornices, porches, trim, balconies, decks and fences, shall be maintained in good condition. Exterior wood surfaces, other than decay-resistant woods, shall be protected from elements and decay by painting or other protective covering or treatment.
